

**GATES COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS
REGULAR MEETING MINUTES
MAY 6, 2015**

The Gates County Board of Commissioners met in Regular Session at 10:00 a.m. Wednesday, May 6, 2015 in the Main Court Room, 202 Court Street, Gatesville. Commissioners Hofler, Owens, Jordan, Felton and Freeman were present. Also present was County Manager, Natalie Rountree.

Commissioner Jordan led in prayer and the pledge of allegiance.

Chairman Hofler called the meeting to order.

Approval of Minutes

Commissioner Jordan made a motion to approve the minutes as presented for April 1, 2015 and April 20, 2015. Commissioner Felton seconded the motion; motion carried unanimously.

Approval of Agenda

Chairman Hofler stated the agenda needs to be adjusted to add budget amendment 18 under new business.

Commissioner Felton made a motion to approve the agenda as adjusted. Commissioner Owens seconded the motion; motion passed without opposition.

Delegations – Unannounced

Elmer Hoggard, Corapeake, has had a problem with neighbors playing loud music from their car and inside their home. He has taken one neighbor to court and has been semi successful but now there is another neighbor that is starting to join in loud noise. It is a nuisance and reduces the value of his home, he would not have bought the property if he would have known this would occur in the neighborhood. Mr. Hoggard would like to work with the County to set up the creation of a quiet zone and will continue to call the Sheriff's Office to enforce the noise ordinance.

Commissioner Jordan & Commissioner Owens encouraged Mr. Hoggard to continue to keep making complaints when neighbors are in violation of the noise ordinance. Going through the court system is the best way to continue. Mr. Hoggard stated sometimes the Sheriff's Office doesn't come out and sometimes the officers don't enforce it so he feels having a declared quiet zone with signs would be helpful.

Sheriff Webb said since the time limit has been taken out of the ordinance a citation can be given at any time of day. The individuals have been arrested and in court many times. If the music is being played when the officers arrive the citation can be given; if the music is turned down when the officer arrives the citizen may go to the magistrate.

Commissioner Jordan recommended looking at the ordinance and seeing if there is any way we can add a quiet zone and if so determine how it would be enforced. Sheriff Webb recommended increasing the fine amount.

Mr. Presnell, Sunbury, said he is having an issue with a neighbor and agrees a sign stating the ordinance would be beneficial and help bring awareness to the community that there is a noise ordinance and it will be enforced.

Dan Bazemore, Eure, stated he has an issue with the billing for the water department. He made it clear he is not talking about any specific individual on the staff; the issue is a number of people he is associated with have issues with the payment going out of state. A number of issues have been brought up and many people have ideas or comments but they will not address the Board in public they only want to speak in private. Currently the water department will only take payments if put in the drop box, paid at the office, or mailed out of state. A person from Eure will pay \$6 or more for their travel not counting their time to use the drop box or make a payment at the office. A number of citizens have had issues

sending their payment out of state and being charged a late fee. After some research has been done the payment has shown up to have arrived in time but the office has said adjustments cannot be made to change the late penalty. Mr. Bazemore feels the only time outsourcing, mailing payments out of state, should be used is when there are not people capable of doing the job and if there are people that could do the job but are not then they should be dismissed. Mr. Bazemore requested the option to mail payments out of state or directly to the office. There should be information placed in the bills and in the newspaper giving people the option to pay in four different ways including mailing into the office.

Chairman Hofler stated there may need to be some clarifications to statements made.

Ms. Hendrix explained there are six different ways for citizens to pay their water bill they can utilize the drop box, mail, pay at the window, official payments by phone, bill pay with accounts receivable and we will be working on bank drafts and debit and credit cards after the new fiscal year.

Ms. Hendrix did provide Mr. Bazemore with PO Box 105 for payment but the post office box will be phased out. The office gets notifications the same day the check arrives at the payment center. If a check shows up where it has cleared a citizens bank before the due date and they are charged a late fee the charge can be removed. Citizens have really appreciated the robocalls and appreciate only having to pay a 10% late fee instead of water being disconnected.

Chairman Hofler explained the payments go out of state because that is where the lockbox for Southern Bank is located. Due to security reasons three different people have to process the checks.

Ms. Hendrix reminded citizens the Customer Service department handles all monies that come into the County from all departments not just water payments.

Mr. Bazemore reiterated we shouldn't pay individuals out of state when we have workers here that could do the job. If we advertised two different mailing options Gatesville would receive more payments.

Commissioner Jordan said it would be a good idea to inform citizens of all 6 options to pay the water bill and make sure that it is put on the website. We may want to also look at the feasibility of keeping the local PO Box open.

Chairman Hofler reiterated it was more cost effective to hire a check clearing system than to hire additional employees.

Ms. Sandy Pittman, Finance Director, stated there was a major reorganization of the department and services and it is less expensive to pay for an outsourced service rather than hire additional staff. The services being offered are more efficient than the office is capable of doing. There is a flat fee of around \$.10 per piece of mail, the projections were less than \$10,000 which is less than hiring additional staff.

Mr. Bazemore thanked Ms. Pittman for the information and reiterated citizens just want to be informed.

Sheriff Ed Webb approached the Board about a young man, Jeremy Brown, from Gates County that was killed in the line of duty. Next week is Law Enforcement Appreciation Week and May 15th in National Law Enforcement Appreciation Day. Ninety years ago yesterday Officer Vernon Eason was killed in the line of duty here in Gates County. Sheriff Webb shared the story of Mr. Eason and in 2010 Mr. Eason was recognized by the State as a fallen officer in the line of duty and now he has been recognized nationally.

Delegations – Announced

Reverend Lycurgus Harrell, Gates Emergency Ministries, said GEMS is being housed at the facility on Medical Center Road and they are not sure if they are planning to be moved soon or where they will be moved to. The organization likes their current placement and feel it is more feasible for the services they offer to citizens. Mr. Harrell asked if GEMS

could remain at the location permanently. They are requesting something in writing that would guarantee the group the ability to stay at the location for the foreseeable future.

Ms. Rountree stated the intent was for the organization to move back to the EIC building but since they are pleased with the location and it is located centrally for clients there is no issue with them remaining at the location. Ms. Rountree has some ideas on additional uses for the EIC building.

Commissioner Jordan made a motion to allow GEMS to remain at the medical center location. Commissioner Owens seconded the motion; motion passed unanimously.

Sterling Baker, NCDOT Division Maintenance Engineer, explained he is making a concentrated effort to visit counties yearly to explain projects as well as hear concerns. Mr. Baker shared funding amounts over the past five years for standing maintenance across the region and funding for standing maintenance specifically in Gates County. Mr. Baker explained how funding is granted and provided a list of primary and secondary roads in the county that will either be resurfaced or retreated over the next three years.

Commissioner Jordan asked what would happen if the department doesn't get around to doing some of these plans will the money be refunded. Mr. Baker said there is not an option to not complete the work.

Commissioner Jordan said Lowe Road off of Millpond Road is paved from 37 to Flat Branch but it is dirt in the middle. Mr. Baker said it is a right-of-way problem and the gravel portions have owners that would not grant right-of-ways.

Commissioner Freeman asked about a bridge replacement that will occur by 2021. Mr. Baker said it is on the schedule but will come out of construction funds. Mr. Baker gave a brief overview of funding changes over the past two years.

Angela Welsh, RPO, presented the Gates County Comprehensive Transportation Plan (CTP). Ms. Welsh explained in January of 2014 the Albemarle RPO and the Transportation Planning Branch began working on the CTP and formed a steering committee of Board members and citizens. The Board is being asked to adopt the maps today and the full plan will be approved and endorsed by the Albemarle RPO. The CTP is a long range transportation plan that is multimodal and funding is not allocated for the projects listed. The projects must go through a state wide points system before funding is awarded, the County is not responsible for providing funding. The Board will be adopting the highway map, public transit and rail map, bicycle map, and pedestrian map. The Gatesville portion will have to be taken out of the plan due to no response from the Town of Gatesville. The projects listed on the maps have not gone through a design process or received environmental permits. After the plan is adopted it will go to Albemarle RPO TAC to endorse and then the plan will be compiled and sent back to the Board of Commissioners for final review but there will not be an opportunity to review the plan.

Commissioner Owens made a motion to adopt comprehensive transportation plan maps and resolution. Commissioner Freeman seconded the motion; motion passed unanimously.

Reba Green-Holley, Gates County Aging & Adult Services Task Force, stated one of the initiatives the task force has is pursuing a senior center. The need for a senior center has been identified and previously the County has approved a resolution to pursue legislation to provide funding. The baby boomers will reach retirement age and life expectancy will increase over the next twenty years. By 2025, 90% of counties will have more people 60 and over than 17 and younger. Currently Gates County's median age is 42 years old which is 1.1 years over the average median age; therefore it is important to pursue a senior center. An establishment of a senior center will end the legacy of the only county in the state to not have a senior center. Ms. Holley presented the Resolution of Support for a Senior Center in Gates County, North Carolina.

Chairman Hofler asked what the predicted cost of a senior center would be. Ms. Holley said there are two types of centers. The first would be a developing center where only a portion of the square footage would be allocated to seniors and the second option would be a full senior center. The development center would be intended to slowly transition into a

full center. There are a lot of variable costs such as types of staffing, programming and the size of the facility that would need to be considered.

Commissioner Owens said it would seem reasonable for legislatures to award \$100,000 since we are the last county to get a senior center and \$100,000 was awarded to Cleveland County who received the funding last.

Mr. Hoggard, Corapeake, said it may help to receive funding if it is a center that is open to all types of people with a specific area targeted for seniors.

Mr. Presnell, Sunbury, stated he would prefer to see the money spent toward our youth since our seniors don't seem to have as many issues and hardships as the youth in the area.

Commissioner Jordan made a motion to approve a Resolution of Support for the Development of a Senior Center in Gates County. Commissioner Freeman seconded the motion; motion passed unanimously.

Administrative Reports

Natalie Rountree, County Manager, presented the managers' report for March 21-April 23, 2015. A walk through and discussion of the historic courthouse was conducted with Sass Conservation, the historic mason and the contractor; a formal report will be provided to the County from Sass Conservation. All departments have submitted their budget requests and meetings were held. All CDBG housing recipients have moved into their houses and the State is expected to visit in May for file monitoring. Latoya Smith, Planning & Permitting Technician, and Michael Carver, Code Enforcement Officer, have both began work. The application for the NCACC Medicaid Reimbursement Program for EMS was submitted on April 20th and a notification is expected by the end of June. Ms. Rountree provided the Board with a list of meetings that have been attended over the past month.

Kathy Lane, Tax Administrator, presented the collectors report to the Board. Chairman Hofler asked about the Keystone Project. Ms. Lane stated it is an ongoing process and they will not be going live with it as soon as they had projected. They are continuing to keep testing and learning the screens before the old server is cut.

Ms. Lane presented five request for refunds to the Board. Commissioner Owens commented the paperwork and supporting documents provided for the refunds is very detailed and helpful to the Board.

Commissioner Jordan made a motion to approve the refund for Barry Willoughby in the amount of \$251.47. Commissioner Felton seconded the motion; motion passed unanimously.

Commissioner Owens made a motion to approve the refund for Kevin James and Lynette Sawyer in the amount of \$121.55. Commissioner Freeman seconded the motion; motion passed unanimously.

Commissioner Owens made a motion to approve the refund for Emily Askew in the amount of \$101.33. Commissioner Freeman seconded the motion; motion passed unanimously.

Commissioner Jordan made a motion to approve the refund for Jody Sawyer in the amount of \$133.63. Commissioner Felton seconded the motion; motion passed unanimously.

Commissioner Owens made a motion to approve the refund for Leslie Proksch and Lois Benton in the amount of \$107.68. Commissioner Freeman seconded the motion; motion passed unanimously.

Ms. Lane reminded the Board of their next E & R meeting.

Commissioner Jordan brought to the attention of the Board that the sewer impact fees were \$19,000 which is a direct result of the assisted living facility. We had budgeted \$1,000 and have brought in an additional \$18,000 of revenue.

Chairman Hofler stated there are budget sessions on Tuesday and Thursday and a night meeting on the 18th. Commissioner Jordan asked if the meeting on the 12th could be moved. The Board agreed to have the budget meeting at 4pm on the 12th and move the E&R case to 6pm on the 18th.

There were no other departmental questions.

Public Hearings

Old Business

Jennifer Baptiste, County Planner, shared the general statute requirement for the Board of Adjustment to have a three year term but there is nothing that states the amount of terms an individual should hold.

Commissioner Jordan asked if there was an ordinance to develop the Planning Board. Ms. Baptiste said the Planning Board is identified in the Zoning Ordinance and the Subdivision Ordinance but it does not detail the rules and regulations that should govern the Board. There is a document that has been prepared and will be presented to the Planning Board for review. The document is intended to provide more structure for the operations of the Planning Board; after the review it will be brought to the Commissioners.

Commissioner Owens said we are at a point where we can't actually refer to prior documents or dates therefore it is time it is established and added into the ordinance. Commissioner Owens encouraged the director to consider how things have been done in the past but to not feel obligated to hold to the past. Ms. Baptiste stated she has reviewed what other communities are doing and what has been working for our Boards and what items haven't been working.

Commissioner Freeman asked if we should think about letting the Planner have the discretion of reappointing an individual for their second term. Commissioner Jordan is in favor of not putting the Planner in the tough spot of making those recommendations.

Commissioner Owens said we have an application from a resident in the County that has not been in the county for too long and if may be good to have a line on the application where the person can be recommended or sponsored by another individual or organization. Ms. Baptiste said she has worked in previous communities that have required the commissioner from that voting district to sign off and approve an application before it is submitted.

Commissioner Felton has asked to be recused from voting on the Planning Board appointments due to a conflict of interest.

Commissioner Jordan made a motion to recuse Commissioner Felton from voting on Planning Board Appointments. Commissioner Freeman seconded the motion; motion passed unanimously.

Commissioner Owens nominated Jonathon Jones for his first three year term to the Planning Board. Commissioner Freeman seconded the motion; motion passed without opposition.

Commissioner Freeman made a motion to reappoint Ms. Brenda Felton to the Planning Board for her second three year term. Commissioner Jordan seconded the motion; motion passed unanimously.

Commissioner Jordan made a motion to reappoint Mr. Wade Askew to the Planning Board for his second three year term. Commissioner Freeman seconded the motion and the Board opened for discussion.

Commissioner Owens asked if it will take three years for a vacant position to come available for a resident of Mintonville to apply. Commissioner Hofler stated Mr. Taylor has applied for the Board of Adjustment but would be willing to serve on either Board.

Commissioner Freeman stated he has a bit of a problem with someone applying for a position and not knowing exactly which Board they are applying for.

Commissioner Jordan rescinded his motion.

Commissioner Freeman made a motion to reappoint Wade Askew. The motion died without a second.

Commissioner Owens made a motion to table the third appointment until applicants can be contacted.

Commissioner Jordan made a motion to reappoint Kenneth Jernigan to the Board of Adjustment for a three year term, Willie Hofler as an alternate for a three year term and Larry Presnell as an alternate for a three year term. Commissioner Owens seconded the motion; motion passed unanimously.

Natalie Rountree, County Manager, presented the proposed 2015/2016 Gates County Fee Schedule. The fee schedule is for review and will be voted on at the May 18th meeting.

Natalie Rountree, County Manager, informed the Board that Ms. Sass with Sass Conservation visited the Historic Courthouse and will preparing a formal report.

New Business

Sandy Pittman, Finance Director, stated the contract for Martin & Starnes is before the Board and she recommends the contract be signed and then we will put out for bid in the fall.

Commissioner Jordan made a motion to approve the letter and contract for Martin & Starnes. Commissioner Freeman seconded the motion; motion passed unanimously.

Sandy Pittman, Finance Director, presented budget amendment 16 for additional EMPG funds.

Commissioner Owens made a motion to approve budget amendment 16 for additional EMPG funds. Commissioner Freeman seconded the motion; motion passed unanimously.

Sandy Pittman, Finance Director, presented budget amendment 17 to increase drug enforcement funds due to the sale of a vehicle obtained through drug enforcement activities.

Commissioner Owens made a motion to approve budget amendment 17 to increase drug enforcement budget. Commissioner Jordan seconded the motion; motion passed unanimously.

Sandy Pittman, Finance Director, presented budget amendment 18 to budget funding for a grant received through homeland security to fund the hurricane prep training.

Commissioner Felton made a motion to approve budget amendment 18. Commissioner Freeman seconded the motion; motion passed unanimously.

Jennifer Baptiste, County Planner, explained some of the issues with the GIS is when information is submitted to the company for updates it is either not done or is not being completed in a timely manner. Without having accurate GIS information the office cannot tell if someone is building on someone else's property. It not only causes issues but is a liability for the County. We need to make sure the information we are putting out for our own use and for third parties is accurate. By bringing someone on staff they would spend about a year correcting issues. If we have a company come in with a team of people they could do it in less time. After an outside company has corrected issues we could hire a position to operate the GIS system and serve as a planner in the planner's absence. The position would have a lot of work to do between GIS, Tax Office, and the Register of Deeds Office.

Ms. Kathy Lane, Tax Administrator, discussed some of the issues the tax office has with the GIS system.

Commissioner Jordan asked what company we use and if a meeting has been held to discuss the issues. Ms. Baptiste stated Atlas is our current GIS vendor and is likely just a regional company. There was a meeting held back in the fall where issues were discussed.

Commissioner Felton feels the current vendor is totally unacceptable, it takes them at least 12-18 months to update small land plots. Commissioner Owens asked how Atlas is compensated. Ms. Baptiste said they typically charge a set amount per parcel in the county. Ms. Lane stated we have a yearly contract for their services and the contract is around \$7,000. Previously updates were supposed to be done twice a year but there are corrections that were sent two years ago that have not been addressed. Ms. Lane has asked them for quarterly updates and for updates to be conducted through spreadsheet submission.

Commissioner Jordan recommended putting out a request for proposal for another vendor to take over the services. Ms. Baptiste said we will have to be careful because although we own the data the vendor owns the website.

Commissioner Jordan made a motion for the Planner to send out a Request for Proposal for updating and possibly maintaining our GIS system. Commissioner Owens seconded the motion; motion passed without opposition.

Ms. Rountree stated the budget that will be presented does not have funding allocated for this project.

Jennifer Baptiste, County Planner, presented to the Board two requests for proposals that were received for the Comprehensive Plan. Holland Consulting submitted a proposal for \$31,800 with an estimated start of April 2015 and completion by November 2015. Benchmark Planning submitted a proposal for \$48,750 with an estimated completion of ten to twelve months.

Chairman Hofler verified the land use plan will be one plan with CAMA highlights, we will not have two plans.

Commissioner Jordan asked what type of funds are budgeted. Ms. Rountree stated we have \$15,500 budgeted for this year and it has been discussed to have it split over two fiscal years.

Commissioner Jordan made a motion to move forward with the Holland Consulting proposal with the dates to be adjusted to June 2015 to January 2016. Commissioner Freeman seconded the motion; motion passed unanimously.

Commissioner Hofler made a motion to modify the agenda to cover item 13 before the budget presentation. Commissioner Jordan seconded the motion; motion passed unanimously.

Chairman Hofler presented the Board with a Resolution in Opposition of Sunday Hunting. We are the last county in the northeastern region of NC to pass the resolution.

Commissioner Owens made a motion to approve the Resolution in Opposition of Sunday Hunting. Commissioner Freeman seconded the motion; motion passed unanimously.

County Manager, Natalie Rountree, presented the FY15-16 Budget to the Board. A binder is being provided with all budget request, budgetary information, and budget highlights. There will be budget workshops next Tuesday and Thursday with the public hearing being at 7pm on May 18th.

Commissioner Jordan made a motion to receive the FY15-16 Budget proposal for review from the county manager. Commissioner Freeman seconded the motion; motion passed without opposition.

Ms. Rountree noted customer service is listed as a separate department and administration and finance are merged together. Vehicle purchases were moved back into each departmental line item instead of being separate.

Commissioner Owens asked how departments would describe the proposed budget. Ms. Rountree feels they will describe it as very tight, most departments were started with a 10% cut and then looked for justifications for funds to be added back.

Commissioner Comments

Chairman Hofler thanked citizens for attending. We love to hear from citizens as you see things in a different light. Please continue to let us know your thoughts and concerns and we look forward to seeing everyone at the meeting on May 18th.

Commissioner Owens thanked citizens for attending and Sheriff Webb for bringing to our attention that May 15th is national law enforcement day. Commissioner Owens thanked county employees for their service and stated the finance department and the tax office did a nice job in their presentations and paperwork today.

Commissioner Jordan thanked citizens for attending and participating. Thanks to the employees for the jobs they are conducting, it takes a lot of work and a lot of time and thank you's do not come with that work. To the citizens, we hear you and when we hear issues we work to find answers and get back with you as soon as possible.

Commissioner Felton thanked everyone for attending and participating. Thanks to the department heads for working to compile a balanced budget. There will be services at the schools and in the courtroom tomorrow for the National Day of Prayer.

Commissioner Freeman thanked the citizens of the county for their participation in the fourth annual Wounded Warrior Turkey Hunt. Commissioner Freeman thanked the Board for their participation and willingness to work as a team and back each other. Commissioner Freeman provided an updates from various meetings he has attended.

Closed Session

Commissioner Owens made a motion to enter into closed session pursuant to NCGS 143-318.11 a (3) Legal, (4) Economic Development, (5) Real Estate, (6) Personnel. Commissioner Jordan seconded the motion; motion passed without opposition.

Commissioner Freeman made a motion to exit closed session. Commissioner Felton seconded the motion; motion carried without opposition.

Adjournment

Commissioner Jordan made a motion to direct the tax administrator to seek guidance from North Carolina Association of County Commissioners and the School of Government for guidance as well as contacting the adjoining land owners to find out their interest in possibly purchasing the property discussed in closed session. Commissioner Freeman seconded the motion; motion passed unanimously.

Commissioner Owens made a motion to direct the county manager to get with the county attorney to draft the letter regarding the matter discussed in closed session. Commissioner Jordan seconded the motion; motion passed without opposition.

Commissioner Jordan made a motion to adjourn. Commissioner Owens seconded the motion; motion passed without opposition.


